TRACI BLISS Speaker for the 2021 Picnic



History in the Making: Comparisons of the 1918 Pandemic and the 2020 Pandemic by Pioneer Board President Jim

We are living in a time that will provide material for historians and commentators for years to come. The disruption of normal activities is largely what history is all about. And hopefully for most of us this Coronavirus pandemic will prove to be no more than that: a temporary disruption of our normal lives.

It is always good to look back at the historical record of similar situations to see if we can avoid the pitfalls of bad decisions when dealing with current problems. So I did a little research on the Spanish Flu pandemic of 1918. There are some very interesting parallels to what is happening today. The virus progressed very quickly, attacking the respiratory system. Victims suffered fever, sweats, delirium, asphyxiation and often death. And like today, there was no vaccine to prevent it nor effective medicine to treat it.



No one knows for sure how many people perished as a result of the 1918 pandemic. Worldwide estimates range as

high as 100 million with US estimates as high as 650,000. But many died at home and did not become part of the official record. So accurate numbers will never be known. What is known is that infection spiked when restrictions were relaxed and diminished when restrictions were kept in place.

The official number of deaths for Santa Cruz was 20 and Watsonville was twice that. The difference is attributed to Santa Cruz's relative isolation. Highways 1 and 17 did not exist and holiday travel was curtailed. So then as now isolation and sanitation provided the only real

<u>New signs in Pringle Grove.</u> The 10-foot sign in Pringle Grove and the small sign on the barbeque honoring Martina Castro had peeling paint and weather damage. The Board hired "The Sign Shop," to refurbish the signs. We are pleased with the results.

The Castro-Lodge Millstones. In the 2019 Pioneers newsletter, we had an article about the history of the Castro-Lodge Millstones that are located near the entrance to Pringle Grove. The stones have settled in

the Earth and the Board felt that they needed to be moved. Our President, Jim Hobbs, reached out to local cement contractor, Shan Gilmore, and he volunteered to build a new base for the stones and to move



them. The base is up against the barbeque, and that will prevent more settling of that structure. We will have the millstones in their new location before the 2021 Picnic.

<u>New Picnic displays</u>. Everyone enjoys looking at the displays of photographs from Soquel Elementary School and other historical images during the Picnic. The Board is currently planning on putting together new displays that are attractive, easy to assemble and weatherproof.

<u>Heart of Soquel Park expansion update.</u> Santa Cruz County Parks is building a Creekside trail starting at the Heart of Soquel Park! The Soquel Pioneer & Historical Association will provide input and historical photos on aspects of the Creek for two or three interpretative panels that will be placed on the Creekside trail. Soquel Creek was key to nearly everything that happened in Soquel for many years.

Soquel During the 2020 Pandemic

The 2020 Covid-19 Pandemic and the Santa Cruz County shelter-in-place order which began on March 16, 2020 is a historical event.

The Soquel Pioneer and Historical Association is in the process of documenting how it is affecting our community for future reference. Following are some examples of the effects.

On most April evenings at 5pm there are 2-4 cars at the intersection of Soquel Drive and Porter Street. The drive from 41st Ave to Porter Street takes 3 minutes! (During normal traffic that distance could take 15 minutes and there would be lines of traffic at that intersection.) All Soquel restaurants, food stores, wineries, coffee shops and cannabis stores are closed to dine-in seating and open only for takeout.

Barbershops, schools, day-care centers, hair salons, massage parlors, offices, and antique stores were closed from March 16 through midlate June. Our Soquel post-office is open and required masks and 6 feet of social distancing. Anna Jean Cummings Park is open but the playground is closed.

More people are seen working in their yards, walking, running and riding bikes because they are not working in their jobs, could not travel or visit family of friends, and are unemployed due to businesses being closed.



Graduations at Soquel schools were held on-line, with 6 feet of spacing, by car parades and other creative ways to recognize the Graduates. *Congratulations Graduates* signs were seen everywhere. Churches are conducting worship services through

a variety of on-line platforms. One benefit of this is that people who moved away from Soquel can enjoy on-line services.

The following Soquel items are from Santa Cruz newspapers during the year 1920. January 12. "The first concrete on the new county unit of highway being built between Arana Gulch and Soquel was poured Saturday afternoon, marking the actual beginning of the first permanently improved section under the \$924,000 bond issue."

January 16. "Norman H. Angell, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. V. Angell of Soquel, . . . returned from a trip to Lexington, Kentucky, where he was sent by the Kappa Alpha fraternity of the University [of California] as a delegate to their convention. . . . When he stopped in Chicago on his way home, he found the weather so cold that census enumerators, who had just started work, were forced to discontinue as the ink in their fountain pens froze."

February 6. "On the upper Capitola Road yesterday morning, L. F. Engles, a painter and paper hanger of Soquel, had a miraculous escape from death when his Ford got frisky and jumped over a bank at an angle of about 45 degrees and broke through the flume about forty feet down below the road."

February 20. "NOTICE. Billy the Barber has retired from business, and I have rented his old stand, and will be glad to meet his many old customers. I am a first-class barber and you will find me ready for business every afternoon, all day Saturday, and from 8:30 to 12 Sundays. I will also take care of your laundry. M. M. Steele, Soquel."

May 16. "A protest against the proposal to annex the Soquel School District to Santa Cruz High School District, as recently proposed by the Board of Education of this city, was filed with the Board of Supervisors this morning by the trustees of the Soquel Union Grammar School District."

July 16. "The guests of Stafford's Inn, a popular summer resort, . . . held a box ball tournament on Wednesday and Thursday of this week. Each player was allowed three games, a total of which made his [or her] score. Tom Prescott made the sensational score of 404 and won first place in the event."

September 13. "INCOME RANCH BARGAIN. Ten acres along Soquel Creek; dandy soil; 6 acres in full bearing orchard; cherries, apples, and peaches; some strawberries; good pumping plant; 6 room house; chicken house and barn; 1 horse; cow and some chickens also go. Price, \$10,000. FRANCIS & PIMENTEL, 140 Pacific Avenue, Phone 430."
